Red does it all by himself using old buckets to tap the trees. He has been generous with his syrup, giving a bottle at Christmastime to residents age 70 and over for some time now.

"A Snapshot of 2021"

2021 started out strong, with a lot of work to be done. One of our first projects and the most important, was to work on the budget. After countless hours and with some negotiations we settled on a budget that we all basically agree to.

With COVID still in the forefront we decided to postpone our town meeting from March to April. This decision allowed us the ability to have it outside and the weather couldn't have been better.

With the budget approved, we started on the long list of projects. The projects were posted and put out for bid. Some of the projects we were able to complete were:

- Grading the roads.
- Replacing the 60" culvert on Elm Street (Labbe Construction).
- Replacing a culvert on Elm Street and one on Ladd Road (Meader Construction).
- Rome Road ditching and removal of berms (Labbe Construction).
- We partnered up with Smithfield to do the Bog Brook culvert (at North Pond boat landing) (Warren Brothers Construction).
- Reclaimed 4400 ft on Beech Hill Road (Pike Industries).
- With Seven Lakes Alliance (grant money) along with matching funds, we did:
 - Pond Road (Warren Brothers Construction)
 - Bacon Road (Labbe Construction)
 - Beech Hill Road (Lamphere Excavation)
- Had crushed granite brought in to repair 2 spots on Elm Street and 2 spots on West Sandy River Road (Meader Construction).
- Repaired approximately 1200 ft of Rome Road with crushed granite, then had the grader (Lamphere Excavation) level it out and rework the shoulders and necessary ditching.
- A large section of tree removal and ditching was done on West Sandy River Road at no cost to the Town. Thank you, Lamphere Excavation!
- We did a patch job beyond the dump on East Sandy River Road (Warren Brothers Construction). We did this incase anything was to happen to the culvert at the brook. There are 2 families that would need a way to get in and out, as well as continued access to the dump.
- The Town got a fair amount of brush cut on Pond Road, Beech Hill Road, Ladd Road and Rome Road. This was all done by volunteers! Thank you!
- We also spent a fair amount of time patching the roof on the Town Office Building.

We were able to hold a FREE Chicken BBQ this summer for our residents. We had approximately 100 people in attendance. We were able to do this at no cost to the

Town by the generosity of those who donated bottles, food, drinks, etc. It was a great chance for people in town to get together. We are hoping to be able to do this again.

This year a group of concerned citizens had the parking lot at the Town Forest leveled. They worked on cleaning up and remarking the walking trails. They've also added a picnic table and a kiosk to the lot! Thank you for volunteering your time and resources for the betterment of the Town.

In mid-September we hired Christine Parent to back up Nancy Gove in the office. If you haven't met her yet, stop in and say Hi!

Due to recent break-in attempts to some of the rooms at the Community Center we have replaced all the locks to the building.

Because of an unfavorable water test we had an Osmosis System installed in the commercial kitchen. We are also having a new hot water heater installed, so it will pass state regulations. We are hoping that once this is completed, we will be able to rent the kitchen out. The Mercer Community Club donated over half of the cost and we greatly appreciate it. Thank you!

There are many items/issues that we haven't mentioned, however we would like to recognize all who volunteered their time, money, energy and support. It is greatly appreciated and we thank you!

When I reflect back over the past couple of years, all the people, contractors, fellow select people, office staff, and volunteers, it just reaffirms what we have always believed, which is "what a great town this is". We are proud to say we live here and we hope you are too.



TOWN CLERK REPORT

To the Citizens of Mercer,

This past year has been a year for positive growth for this Town.

First and foremost, the voters at our annual town meeting voted to appoint the positions of the town clerk, tax collector and treasurer. This change will take effect with the 2022 town meeting. By appointing these positions, the select board has control over the conduct, performance and duties of the appointed official(s).

Voters also approved electing a 5-member Budget Committee through the nomination process. That change will also take effect with the 2022 Town Meeting and Election.

We devoted some time to the care and management of our cemeteries this year. A cemetery sexton was appointed, Brian Breton. He is assisting the town with clean up, care and management of cemeteries. We are looking into creating a cremation section at Village Cemetery. The Hampshire Hill Cemetery Association approached the town this year and asked that we take over this cemetery. Association members have either passed away or moved away to the point that there are only a few members left. They're in hopes that the Town will accept the cemetery and perpetual care funds at town meeting 2022.

The new marijuana cultivation and manufacturing ordinance went into effect. Once that happened, the town had to develop an application and establish the process for approval under this ordinance. The town received three applications of which one has been approved to date.

MSAD #54 held its annual budget validation referendum election on June 8th. Mercer had a low turnout; voters did not support the school budget by a vote of 17 yes to 19 no votes. The school held another election on August 31st to authorize the district to issue bonds for school construction and minor capital projects – a total of \$6,970,000. There were 20 votes cast, Mercer supported this referendum question.

Thankfully the November 2nd State Referendum Election proceeded smoothly without me at the helm this year. COVID reared its ugly head and struck me down literally a day before this election. I scrambled to put together a team. A huge thank you to Maddy Pierce of the Town of Anson who was able to step in as Deputy Clerk for the day and run the election for us and to Bonnie Baker of the Town of Farmington who assisted with end of night reporting duties to the Secretary of State. I am truly grateful that you both came to my rescue. The clerk network is strong in Maine and it's wonderful to see clerks come together to help each other out.

Vital records recorded in 2021 for Mercer were as follows: Births -7; Marriages -9; Deaths -8.

Dog licenses issued in 2021 were as follows: 31 male/female; 127 spayed/neutered, with 6 dogs licensed online. To use the online option, go to the website mercermaine.com and it'll link you over to the animal welfare site. Please remember that dog licenses expire December 31st annually. Bring proof of rabies. Fee is \$11/dog if capable of reproducing or \$6 if spayed or neutered. Effective February 1st, a late fee of \$25 goes into effect for any unlicensed dogs.

Inland Fisheries & Wildlife sporting license and registration activity in 2021 was as follows: snowmobiles registrations – 83; ATV registrations – 85; boat registrations – 80 and Hunting/Fishing licenses, etc. – 105.

The Town of Mercer has two part-time deputy clerks, Christine Parent and Tammy Lamphere. Both have taken election and registrar training. I hope to be able to provide more training opportunities this coming year. Cross-training continues to be our goal for the town office. Thanks for all the hard work you've given ladies! Teamwork makes a difference!

Report of the Registrar of Voters

To the Citizens of Mercer:

The Registrar's office is open during normal business hours of the town office, on election day as well as for two hours between 5 pm and 7 pm prior to elections for the purpose of registering new voters, changing existing voter information and enrollment into or out of political parties.

Registered and enrolled voters of Mercer are as follows:

Democrats – 142 Green Independent – 24 Republican – 210 Unenrolled – 202

Maine State Law requires a 15-day waiting period if you are <u>changing parties</u> before the new party enrollment becomes effective, i.e. before you are able to participate in that party's primary, caucus or convention. If you are <u>unenrolled</u> (<u>no political party choice</u>), you may enroll in a party effective immediately upon completing a voter registration application.

TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Mercer.

Tax bills for 2021 went out the beginning of July. The Board of Assessor's kept the same mil rate as last year, \$17.60 per \$1,000 of value. A 2% discount was offered to anyone who paid their tax bill within 30 days. The value of the homestead exemption decreased this year to \$24,250 because our valuation continues to drop below what the state valuation for Mercer is.

Tax liens for delinquent 2020 taxes were recorded on June 29, 2021. Lien fees plus the accumulated interest were added to the original tax to become the liened taxes now due. We accept partial payments on taxes-whatever you can afford as often as you can afford it. It all helps in the long run.

We are now in our second year of processing motor vehicle registrations electronically. We have the ability to send you by email a renewal reminder notice to register your vehicle. You can renew your registration online. Visit the town's website: mercermaine.com and click on the online registration link. Excise taxes collected in 2021 were \$159,475, an increase of almost \$10,000 over last year.

I would like to thank Marty Kitchen, deputy tax collector and a Mercer resident, who volunteered her time to help with the online vehicle registration database, updating the email addresses for the reminder notices, and assisted with other motor vehicle duties. She has been a valued asset to the success of the tax collector's office.

In addition to Marty, I have appointed Christine Parent and Tammy Lamphere as deputy tax collectors. Together we are making progress – getting motor vehicle training under us, learning the requirements of a tax collector,



and most importantly cross-training. Our goal is to be able to continue the day-to-day operations of this office in the event one of us is out. Thanks for all your hard work ladies!

Report of the Treasurer

To the Citizens of Mercer:

Where to begin...I took over Treasurer duties in February, 2021. My first charge was to post the auditors adjusting entries from the 2020 audit, fix some old checks that never were cashed and reconcile the bank statement. It took a few months to get the statement to balance with the cash account, but it now does.

Mary Burr volunteered to assist me with the Treasurer duties. I deputized and trained Mary to help with payables, payroll and checkbook reconciliation. The auditor made it clear that there should be segregation of duties surrounding the cash and with Mary's help, we were able to accomplish this.

I was able to collect some old personal property taxes and get them off the books. We wrote off some old real estate taxes. I need to research some old real estate taxes which remain on the books and there are still some old personal property taxes to research.



The backbone of the financial structure of the town is our Chart of Accounts. It is so important to have a solid account structure which allows for growth in all categories. The auditor recommended that we change the structure to include a 2-digit fund (where we currently had 1-digit available to us) as we have more than 9 different funds. The Selectboard authorized this change. I worked on creating our new funds. The actual change took place after the close of the calendar year but before the first business day of the new year. It was a huge undertaking but it will make bookkeeping easier and more importantly, accurately reporting all fund activities moving forward.

In September we hired Christine Parent. She is learning all aspects of running a town office, a process that will probably take a couple of years to learn. There are so many processes that happen at varying times of the year, that you need a full year to see it once, let alone really grasp it.

Running a town office should not be done by one person – it's too much work. There is a risk/liability to the town if we do not cross-train and segregate out duties. Once that knowledge walks out the door, who and what do you have left? My advice has always been to protect the functioning of the town office. Plus, we need to separate out duties to eliminate the risks for fraud, not just to protect the town but also to protect the employees. It's sound business practice. I hope that you will support the positive changes that are occurring in our cozy little town of Mercer.

Board of Assessors' Report

The goal of the tax assessment this coming year is to identify and assess property within the Town of Mercer and ensure the fairness and equity of all real and personal property values, thoughtfully interpret and comply with statutory laws as mandated by the State of Maine, update and maintain accurate maps used to provide geographic data analysis, process all recorded legal documents in a timely manner to reflect accurate records of property ownership and to efficiently provide the public with quality products and services. To accomplish this goal, the assessors have hired an assessor's agent to assist the Board.

Every year new construction and additions to existing structures are visited and assessed, as well as properties which are reported or known to have had structural damage or structure removal. In addition, approximately one quarter of the 465 residential and seasonal properties in Mercer are visited each year. The purpose of the visits of previously assessed properties is to verify the accuracy of property records against the physical facts. Photos and sketches of the structures were recorded (this did not involve entering the buildings) as the primary focus is on the size and number of structures and secondarily, the existence of utilities such as electricity, wells and septic systems.

Some properties were found to have additional structures or notable improvement, some structures were found to have degraded, a few had deteriorated seriously. This verification process should continue annually, with approximately 25% of Mercer properties being visited each year, to satisfy the State Law requiring all properties to be visited every 4 years.

All property is assessed based on its condition on April 1st. If you purchase or sell property after April 1st, the owner of the property on April 1st will receive the tax bill per state law.

All non-exempt personal property located on your land (including travel trailers not registered (excised) on April 1st are taxed to the landowner unless claimed by another Mercer resident. Everyone is required by state law to list their personal property with the assessors by April 1st of each year. Personal Property forms are available at the town office. If you have paid excise tax on a piece of equipment, please mark your list accordingly so it isn't taxed twice.

The Board of Assessors received an annual visit from the State. Their preliminary State Valuation for Mercer is as follows:

2021 State Valuation for Mercer: \$71,600,000 2022 State Valuation for Mercer: \$76,900,000

ASSESSORS' NOTIFICATION TO TAXPAYERS

Information on all properties in Mercer are available for inspection or review by taxpayers and the public during regular office hours. Requests related to property taxes, tax policy or law, tax exemptions, etc. are processed as quickly as possible.

In order for the Town of Mercer to maintain fair and equitable assessments and accurate information for the allocation of municipal property taxes, taxpayers are asked to provide up to date information about their property. This is done by completing a Notification to Assessors form which can be found on our website at **mercermaine.com** or at the Town Office. Please contact the Town Office at 587-2911 if:

- 1 you have constructed, altered or removed any buildings since April 1, 2021 and on or before April 1, 2022;
- 2 you have started a new business, to obtain forms for filing a list of your business furniture and equipment;
- 3 you have taxable* personal property items (*individual item with value greater than \$1000) In accordance with Title 36, Section 706 of the Maine Revised Statutes, failure to furnish lists of taxable property or any of the aforementioned changes on or before the dates requested will bar one's right of an abatement of taxes; or
- 4 you think your property should have an exemption, and you are not already receiving it

All notifications and applications for exemption must be made no later than April 1, 2022 for the 2022 tax year. In the case of property owned by individuals, there are possible exemptions for certain veterans, blind persons, and homestead owners as described below.

Veterans who will be 62 years of age on or before April 1, 2022, or any widow or minor children of veterans who would have been 62 years of age as of April 1, 2022 **may be** eligible for a tax exemption. **Veterans** receiving a 100% disability pension from the Veterans Administration **may be** eligible for an exemption. Applications for veteran's exemption must be made with this office on or before April 1, 2022. If you are currently receiving a veteran's exemption, you do not need to reapply. The current Veteran Exemption amount is 6,000

Any person who is declared blind by a licensed doctor should notify Assessors on or before April 1, 2022 to see if he or she is eligible for a tax exemption. If you are already receiving such an exemption, you do not need to reapply. The current Blind Exemption amount is 4,000.

Homestead. A person who owns his or her own home and has owned a home in Maine for at least 12 months on or before April 1, 2022 can apply for a Homestead Exemption. The application needs to be received in the office by April 1, 2022. One can only receive this exemption on the home that is his or her residence. If you are currently receiving this exemption, and you still reside in the same home, you do not need to reapply. The current (2022) Homestead Exemption amount is 25,000.

2021 REPORT OF THE NORRIDGEWOCK FIRE DEPARTMENT



Since October of 2020, our full-time firefighters have been readily available Monday through Friday, 7:30 AM to 4:30 PM for any type of emergencies. Fire Permits are available at no charge by calling the station at 634-2208 or online through the State of Maine.

As a friendly reminder, be sure that when you have an emergency, dial 9-1-1.

New staff joins our team:

- Former Firefighter Dan Greaney. Originally from Mercer, Dan returns to NFD as a firefighter and paramedic. Dan will oversee the Department's EMS program.
- Firefighter Spencer Wyman of Norridgewock (son of longtime Firefighter Daryl Wyman). Spencer
 is also an active full-time firefighter at Skowhegan Fire.
- Norridgewock resident Dean Harding joined our team as firefighter in August.
- Junior Firefighter Megan Jones (daughter of Firefighter Ryan Jones) has recently completed the Basic Fire School and is ready for action.

We currently have a roster of 21 members with the loss of one this year to retirement. Lieutenant Dennis Obert, longtime Mercer resident, retired after 35 years of dedicated service to the Department. Dennis has been a respected leader and an unwavering gentleman in service to his community. Dennis can usually be seen driving the 1935 Maxim fire truck in parades (as he is in the photo to the right, escorting 2021 Oosoola Days Parade Grand Marshal, Firefighter Jim Gordon). We will miss him on our roster, but know that he won't be any stranger to the fire



house. Also, this year, Firefighter/EMT Adam Keene transitioned out of the department with 3 years of service to Mercer and Norridgewock.

A big round of applause goes to the following firefighters for making themselves better in the medical field and for our community: Firefighter/Paramedic Aaron Gordon, Firefighter/EMT-B Joshua Corson, and Firefighter/EMT-B Tanisha Corson. This Department is very proud of these individuals who dedicated countless hours to better themselves and especially to our communities we serve. We continue to be licensed under Maine EMS as a non-transporting agency.

Unfortunately, due to the Coronavirus, our meetings and trainings were reduced to only those that were required. We also were unable to utilize the Fire Safety House this year, and Trick-or-Treating at the Fire Station was canceled. Members of the Department volunteered to support a cooperative program with the Norridgewock Public Library—providing families an opportunity to see the trucks and equipment, and try shooting targets with the fire hose! We also had a great time at Oosoola Days, where we were set up for the day at the Airport. In support of Fire Safety Month, full-time Firefighters Corson and Dexter joined Skowhegan Captain Rick Caldwell in educating the youngsters at Mill Stream Elementary. The children learned about general fire safety, got to see a firefighter don turnout gear, get inside of a fire engine, and each received an activity book. Santa also made a grand return to Norridgewock this year. The jolly old man sat for pictures with children at the fire station during the Holiday Stroll and spent another day riding around town to deliver chocolates to seniors. We are fortunate to have a great group of dedicated firefighters that don't hesitate to volunteer their time to make our community a better place.

This spring, our 2000 Dodge (Unit #24—utility/forestry truck) received an overdue facelift due to its deteriorating condition. A new aluminum body was installed on the unit (F3 Manufacturing, Waterville, ME) and a new pull-out pump and accessories that go were added (Kimtek Orleans, VT). This truck goes on the majority of all calls, and has outlived its life in this Maine weather. The water pump

and tank assembly can be removed easily during winter operations.

To assist the Department in grant developing and helping to improve the chances of award, NFD contracted with First Responder Grants, LLC. Consultant Greg Bavis has worked closely with Department Officers to refine grant applications on behalf of NFD.

 In December, the Department received a remarkable \$40,000 grant from the Stephen & Tabitha King Foundation that will be used to purchase the battery-operated extrication tools (Jaws of Life). Our current hydraulic extrication tools are approximately 21 years old. This grant also includes stabilizing struts.




We have been awarded the 2022 Volunteer Fire Assistance Grant
(Forestry Grant) through the Maine Forest Service for a total of \$4,760. This year's grant will go
towards updating forestry coats and helmets; the current gear was purchased in 2005.

Numerous times a year, we respond to homes without any proper identification of a house number. In a dire emergency, this simple number could mean either saving your home from a fire or losing it entirely. If possible, when summonsing emergency responders to your home, apartment, or business, please have someone waiting out front, visible from the roadway to guide such services. This really helps! So please, number your home and mailboxes (on <u>both</u> sides) for you to get the help you need in the least amount of time. If you have a fire hydrant in your yard, we ask your help to keep it clear of snow and/or debris. *Please do not block, cover, hide, or park in front of a fire hydrant!*

Sadly, according to the Maine Fire Marshall's Office Maine finished the year with 27 fire deaths; this is an increase from 17 of last year's in 2020. Be sure you have good working smoke detectors no older than 10 years, to include fresh batteries. Consider changing the batteries at the time you change the clocks—or better yet, purchase the 10-year, worry free, sealed lithium battery!

Effective January 1, 2022, a new gas detector law which requires fuel gas detectors to be installed in certain types of structures, including multi-family homes, businesses, etc. The full chaptered law is included, following this Department Report. For other supplemental heat, such as woodstoves, a chimney brush is available at the station for resident use at no cost. Please call the station first to reserve it.



What is "Mutual Aid" you ask? It is when another fire department has requested more help whether, it be firefighters or a truck with water, such as our 3,000-gallon tanker. As of August 9, 2021, we have an automatic mutual aid agreement with Skowhegan Fire, meaning that in the event of a structure fire in Mercer or Norridgewock, Skowhegan is automatically dispatched. Conversely, if there is a structure fire in Skowhegan, Norridgewock automatically responds. In 2021, discussions were initiated, in terms of creating a mutual aid agreement with New Sharon, that would greatly benefit the Town of Mercer.

Departments are scrambling to recruit volunteer firefighters. Like the majority of other fire departments across Maine and the nation, Norridgewock Fire depends largely on volunteers. Are you interested in community service? Do you think you would enjoy firefighting? Please stop by the station or call and speak with our firefighters. Applications to join the Department are available at the station.

As we do each year, Norridgewock Fire Department would like to thank the residents and taxpayers of Mercer for their continued support!

Proudly serving the Towns of Mercer and Norridgewock MRS Title 25, §2469. FUEL GAS DETECTORS

§2469. Fuel gas detectors

- Fuel gas detector. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, "fuel gas detector" means a device:
 - A. With an assembly that incorporates a sensor control component and an alarm notification that detects elevations in propane, natural gas or any liquified petroleum gas;
 - B. That sounds a warning alarm; and
 - C. That is approved or listed for the purpose specified in paragraph B by a nationally recognized independent testing laboratory.

A fuel gas detector may be battery-operated, plugged into an electrical outlet or hardwired.

- 2. Fuel gas detector required. The building owner shall install, or cause to be installed, in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements at least one approved fuel gas detector in every room containing an appliance fueled by propane, natural gas or any liquified petroleum gas in:
 - A. Each unit in any building of multifamily occupancy;
 - B. A fraternity house, sorority house or dormitory that is affiliated with an educational facility;
 - C. A children's home, emergency children's shelter, children's residential care facility, shelter for homeless children or specialized children's home as defined in Title 22, section 8101, subsections 1, 2, 4, 4-A and 5, respectively;
 - D. A hotel, motel or inn;
 - E. A mixed-use occupancy that contains a dwelling unit;
 - F. A business occupancy;
 - G. A mercantile occupancy; or
 - An assembly occupancy.
- Residential rental units. In a residential rental unit occupied under the terms of a rental agreement or under a month-to-month tenancy:

- A. At the time of each occupancy, the landlord shall provide fuel gas detectors in accordance with subsection 2 if fuel gas detectors are not already present. Each fuel gas detector must be in working condition. After notification, in writing, by the tenant of any deficiencies in a fuel gas detector, the landlord shall repair or replace the fuel gas detector. If the landlord did not know and had not been notified of the need to repair or replace a fuel gas detector, the landlord's failure to repair or replace the fuel gas detector may not be considered evidence of negligence in a subsequent civil action arising from death, property loss or personal injury; and
- B. The tenant shall keep the fuel gas detectors in working condition by keeping the fuel gas detectors connected to the electrical service in the building or keeping charged batteries in battery operated fuel gas detectors, by testing the fuel gas detectors periodically and by refraining from disabling the fuel gas detectors.
- 4. Transfer of building. A person who, after January 1, 2022, acquires by sale or exchange a building listed in subsection 2, paragraph A shall install fuel gas detectors in accordance with subsection 2 in the acquired building within 30 days of acquisition or occupancy of the building, whichever is later, if fuel gas detectors in accordance with subsection 2 are not already present, and shall certify at the closing of the transaction that fuel gas detectors will be installed. This certification must be signed and dated by the person acquiring the building. A fuel gas detector must be installed in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements at the time of installation in each area containing an appliance fueled by propane, natural gas or liquified petroleum gas. A person may not have a claim for relief against a property owner, a property purchaser, an authorized agent of a property owner or purchaser, a person in possession of real property, a closing agent or a lender for any damages resulting from the operation, maintenance or effectiveness of a fuel gas detector. Violation of this subsection does not create a defect in title.
- 5. Penalties. A person who violates this section commits a civil violation for which a fine of not more than \$500 for each violation may be adjudged. The court may waive any penalty or cost against a violator upon satisfactory proof that the violation was corrected within 10 days of the issuance of a complaint.
- 6. Liability. Nothing in this section gives rise to any action against an owner required to comply with subsection 2 or 3 if the owner has conducted an inspection of the required fuel gas detectors immediately after installation and has reinspected the fuel gas detectors prior to occupancy by each new tenant, unless the owner has been given at least 24 hours' actual notice of a defect or failure of the fuel gas detector to operate properly and has failed to take action to correct the defect or failure.
- 7. Noninterference. A person may not knowingly interfere with or make inoperative any fuel gas detector required by this section, except that the owner or the agent of an owner of a building may temporarily disconnect a fuel gas detector in a dwelling unit or common area only for construction or rehabilitation activities each day, regardless of the intent to return to construction or rehabilitation activities on succeeding days.

Plumbing Inspectors Report

Dear Mercer Residents

A total of 17 plumbing permits were issued in 2021, which is pretty impressive for a little town like Mercer. This amount is up more than 35% compared to 2020, and probably stems from the hot housing market requiring a number of sold homes to get new septics.

The permits broke down as follows:

4 Internal plumbing permits

13 Subsurface Wastewater plumbing permits

Since plumbing reports are probably fairly low on the impress-o-meter when it comes to Town reports, I thought I'd try to add some juicy gossip and share a story of one of the worst contractors I've seen over my 11 years of being an inspector.

The story starts out innocently enough during my drive to work one morning in the early spring of 2021. While driving along, I happened to notice what appeared to be a mini submarine breaching out of someone's front lawn. After doing a double take and turning around to investigate further, I quickly realized the "submarine" was actually a 1500 gallon plastic septic tank which had literally floated out of the ground earlier that winter (it had just appeared again as the snow melted). It was obvious that this tank must have been installed within the past 6 months, but I had absolutely no record of the tank on file, and had never inspected it when it went in. In other words, this was a pretty blatant violation from some fly-by -night operation.

After typing up a nasty-gram and sending it off to the landowners, I was contacted by them within a few short days. They were not only surprised by my letter, but confused as to why there was an issue, as their contractor had informed them that everything had been permitted and inspected as needed. The owners informed me that they had recently bought the camp, and that the existing septic had failed upon inspection and needed to be replaced. They had hired a site evaluator to design a new system, and had then hired a contractor (which their realtor had recommended) to permit and install their new design. This, unfortunately, is where the wheels fell off the bus.... The contractor (Vacationland Services, now apparently out of business), had taken a hefty chunk of money from the homeowners, and then proceeded to break every rule they possibly could. How bad could it be you ask? Well, after looking at the holding tank design the site evaluator had drawn up, I realized that the contractor had more or less screwed up every conceivable thing they could have. Not only did they not get a permit or an inspection, they also installed a tank that was 500 gallons too small, made of the wrong material (plastic instead of heavy-duty reinforced concrete), installed it in the wrong location (it was literally in the DOT right of way!), and with no antifloatation protection (hence the "breached submarine" look)! So, to recap, installed illegally, in the wrong place, with the wrong size, using the wrong material.....!

The story only gets better though, as the contractor had the nerve to come into my office and exclaim angrily that they knew exactly what they were doing since they were a State Licensed Plumbing Inspector and worked for the Town of South Thomaston. Wow....just....wow....

The contractor then proceeded to write a bad check to the Town for a permit ("insufficient funds"go figure!) and then tried to rebury the same tank in the same location (literally repeating the same violation)! After I put a stop work order on the site, the homeowner fired the unbelievable contractor, and hired someone who was competent to correct the colossal screw up.

As for the contractor, after I verified that they were indeed licensed by the state as a plumbing inspector, I immediately contacted the State Licensing Official and State Plumbing Inspector to have the license revoked (it was). I also called the Town of South Thomaston to inform them of their useless inspector, but found that I was apparently too late, as they had already been fired for other similar incompetent acts. Finally, I contacted the realtor who had recommended the contractor in the first place, and informed them of the nightmare which had unfolded from it.

As for the poor homeowner, they ended up more or less paying to have the job done twice. What should have been a straight-forward \$5-\$6k job, turned into a \$12,000 major headache...ouch. No word yet as to whether they plan on taking the contractor to small claims court, but if so, I'll be there with bells on as a supporting witness!

I'd love to leave you with some pearl of wisdom or moral which we can glean from this horror show, but really, other than the contractor being a dud, it's hard to lay blame on anyone. The homeowner had trusted the realtor's recommendation, and the realtor apparently had seen other jobs from this contractor which had gone well. I guess what it boils down to is, ask around, get references, and be involved, because some people (like this contractor) just plain suck!

Mercer Cemetery Sexton Annual Report 2021

On June 10, 2021 the position of Cemetery Sexton was filled in the Select Board's meeting. I, Brian Breton of Mercer volunteered, was nominated and voted to the position.

I spent late summer and fall getting familiar with the laws, rules. records, and the physical grounds of the town's cemeteries.

In June of 2021 the town was approached by the association that maintains the Hampshire Hill Cemetery. They intend to dissolve the nonprofit and want to give the responsibility and perpetual care fund to the Town of Mercer. The Select Board has asked the town's legal council and MMA for advice.

By the fall we cleaned up all 3 of the cemeteries with the most cleanup at the Lander's and Village cemeteries on Main Street. We filled an entire dump truck with branches and downed trees.between both of them.

Plans for 2022 include minor fence repairs, official signs at entrances, laying out a single lot cremation area, continued verification of town burial records and historical data. We are also looking at the process involved in using software for cemetery and burial records we have. They would be available online for easy access, a backup to old paper records, and allow easy management of the properties.

I first want to thank the residents and selectmen of Mercer for their continuous support. It is great to see, hear and feel. We currently have six active Rescue members covering calls. A huge thank you to our members volunteering their time to serve the community. They are Aaron Gordon, Karen Ayer, Patrick Crowley, Tanisha Corson, Adam Greaney and Adam Keene.

2021 was a challenging year with the Covid-19 Pandemic ongoing as well as a reduction in availability of our volunteers. Mercer Shaw Public Library Annual Report 2021

The Town Library has been open to the community all of 2021 as we have learned how to do so safely during the pandemic. Visits to the library increased 20% from last year's low of 1,137 (due to the COVID closure) to 1,411 this year with 595 items having been signed out. Patrons are able to browse the book stacks, check out books, use the computer or their personal devices to access the Internet, make copies, participate in programs, etc. Residents not experiencing any COVID-like symptoms are welcome inside as long as masks are worn, safe social distance observed, and length of visits limited. When more space and/or time is needed for small group or scheduled Zoom meetings, patrons may move into the solarium if it is available. For those who feel uncomfortable coming into the building, books can also be requested and signed out over the phone or via email for pick up and/or curbside delivery.

With funds received from the America Rescue Plan Act, a HEPA air purifier has been purchased and installed to help remove viruses, allergens, dust, etc. from the air in the library. The remainder of the funds will be used to purchase iPads primarily to support local students but will also be available for adult use, an updated circulation computer and backup system, cleaning and sanitizing supplies, COVID/pandemic related books and periodicals, funding of upcoming community programs, and other allowable purchases.

The children's section is open again, and has been reorganized by age, reading ability and grade level. There are rugs and comfy chairs for children to decide which books they would like to take home or to listen to a story. There is also a "maker's table" where patrons of any age can add a piece to an ongoing jigsaw puzzle, draw, or construct a quick craft.

The local artist/artisan works are on display again as well. The library was granted stewardship this year of a lovely Wurlitzer spinet piano generously donated to the Community Center by Chris and Dorothy Beeuwkes. Folks are welcome to play it when they stop in or use it by appointment for lessons or practicing.

Our dynamic collection now includes over 7,600 books in print, with an ever-expanding array of titles. Categories include general fiction, crime, romance, science fiction, historical fiction, westerns, non-fiction, poetry, and reference materials for all ages and tastes. Our audiobook collection now includes more than 70 titles. The entire collection is replenished with new books purchased monthly - many requested by our patrons - and donations from patrons.

Although we were able to host three <u>Mug Up Social Gatherings</u> in 2021 as the pandemic appeared to wane briefly last June, we suspended them once again due to the subsequent surge in COVID cases. Resuming this event is always part of the plan, and it will be reinstated as soon as we feel that it is safe for our Silver Citizens to gather socially once again.

Library sponsored <u>Pickleball Games</u> regularly take place on Tuesday and Thursday from 11:15 to ~12:30pm. Rackets, balls, and net are available to use in the Community Center gym where a regulation size court has been delineated. This activity is free of charge with tutorials offered for newcomers. Please inquire at the library if interested or drop in to watch a game or two and see what Pickleball is all about. Social distancing and COVID screening are required, and face coverings are encouraged during play.

Currently, the library is open to local residents Tuesday 1:30-5:30pm, Wednesday 12-4pm, Saturday 9:00am-1:00pm, and on Thursdays by appointment by calling 207-779-3977 or emailing mercer shawlibrary@gmail.com. Mercer Town Charter Committee Report

At the town meeting in 2019 Article 53 read "To see if the Town will elect from the floor an exploratory committee to research town charters and present the research to the municipal officers and to town meeting in 2021". The town voted to approve the article and elected Denis Culley, Julia Howard, Fred Laplante, Chris Beeuwkes and Bob Burr as the committee. In the following weeks committee members independently gathered and reviewed many town charters trying to identify what topics might be suitable for Mercer. Before the committee met in person, Covid intervened and the members were not able to gather in person. By the end of 2020 it was decided to ask the town at the 2021 town meeting for an extension (Article 45). The town approved the extension.

With continued Covid concerns, the committee did not meet through the summer of 2021. By September an effort was made to re-group and two members (Laplante and Howard) indicated they were unable to remain on the committee. In October the select board was made aware of the vacancies and the committee sought their advice about how to proceed. Since the committee members were elected at Town Meeting the select board thought that it would be best to refer the matter to the town in 2022 rather than appoint two members to fill the vacancies.

North Pond Association

The North Pond Association (NPA) is grateful to partner with Mercer residents and town officials to help protect the watershed which in turn helps protect the water quality in North and Little Ponds. As many of you are aware, NPA is an all-volunteer organization that includes more than 150 members. It is run by a board of 12 volunteers from Mercer, Rome and Smithfield. The NPA is very thankful to the Town of Mercer for your continued support. The monetary funding, we request each year is earmarked to help pay for the annual cost of the Courtesy Boat Inspector (CBI) Program. These paid employees are hired and trained by 7 Lakes Alliance as the first line of defense in our quest to keep aquatic invasives from entering our lake. Additionally, they help educate boaters on the importance of always checking their watercraft when entering and exiting a waterbody. When an invasive is found, North Pond's ecosystem could forever be altered because of the rapidly growing plants impact on our native aquatic plants, fish and animals. The cost of eradication is exponentially more than the cost of prevention, so thank you again for your continued support!

We were so thankful that one of our CBI's detected, and prevented, a fragment of Eurasion Water Milfoil from entering the lake this summer. The following CBI program numbers were provided to NPA from 7 Lakes Alliance. Summer 2021: North Pond CBI's inspected 1,323 boats, an increase of 37 boats over 2020 (1,286). There were 57 plants removed and fortunately only 1 of them was an invasive plant, Eurasian Water Milfoil. Paid Coverage runs from 7 AM - 7 PM, Monday - Sunday. We are thankful for the 7 hours of coverage by volunteers in 2021 and would welcome and appreciate additional volunteers to cover early morning and evening hours. There is FREE training available, it can be found at northpondmaine.org. The NPA paid \$13,000 to 7 Lakes Alliance for the CBI program with collective funds from the towns of Mercer, Rome and Smithfield. Bottle redemption monies also defray the CBI cost, with the remaining balance covered by NPA membership dues and donations.

During the summer of 2021, Curly Leaf Pondweed, an invasive aquatic plant, was found in the Serpentine in East Pond. Upon further search, there were small infestations found in Old Mill Stream in North Pond as well. Those infestations were removed, and we are working with 7 Lakes Alliance to create an Adopt-A-Shoreline program to encourage all those on the water to look for Curly Leaf Pondweed, especially those along Mill Stream. There will also be a lake-wide plant paddle to determine if Curly Leaf Pondweed has moved to other parts of the lake. We are hopeful that it has not. Even though the infestations in the Serpentine in East Pond were removed, upon further inspection this fall we have found that the Curly Leaf has returned.

North Pond experienced another serious, summer algae bloom in 2021. It arrived later in the summer, but it did arrive. In response to the increased algae blooms a grant application from Maine DEP was applied for and awarded. **The North Pond Watershed-Based Management Plan** (WBMP) project was approved by Maine DEP, and a grant has been awarded to the Kennebec County Soil & Water Conservation District (KCSWCD). The District has contracted with Ecological Instincts to provide project management and planning services for this two-year project which kicks-off in January 2022. With the completion of the WBMP, there will be a well-defined plan that will include remediation recommendations to improve lake water quality. The project partners include: NPA, Colby College, Maine DEP, 7 Lakes Alliance, the towns of Mercer, Rome and Smithfield, and KCSWCD.

All of those residing in the Belgrade Watershed have a part to play in trying to improve water quality so that everyone can enjoy time on the lake. LakeSmart is an excellent program, managed

by Maine Lakes to help property owners in the watershed learn about what they can do. Once contacted, NPA LakeSmart coordinators will visit your property and suggest inexpensive projects such as planting a buffer, installing a gutter, etc. to help prevent erosion. When sediment is allowed to enter the water, it carries phosphorus and in turn this phosphorus feeds the algae. As a result, the water quality is affected, and a bloom can occur. You can find more information about LakeSmart on our website, northpondmaine.org or the Maine Lakes site, lakes.me. There is also an opportunity to learn more at our, "R U Buff Enough?" workshop to be held on Saturday, July 9 from 9-11 at the Smithfield Grange.

NPA has been involved with Charlie Baeder, 319 Coordinator for 7 Lakes Alliance, to manage our 319 Grant Funded Projects in the past and for those that are scheduled in the future. We are very thankful for the support of the Town of Mercer in helping to fund some of these projects. It is also important to note that some of those grants can help finance projects to control erosion on camp roads and driveways. For more information contact Charlie.baeder@7lakesalliance.org.

The 1st Annual Pike Fishing Derby will be held on February 12 and some of the summer NPA sponsored activities include Earth Day clean-up at the Boat Landing, Adopt-A-Shoreline and Invasive Plant ID Workshops and Plant Paddles, and our Annual Meeting to be held remotely on Tuesday, August 9 at 7:00 PM.

NPA's mission since 1985, has been to protect, preserve and educate. We are able support this mission with help from: the towns of Mercer, Rome and Smithfield, NPA members, private donations, local businesses, volunteers, and collaboration with 7 Lakes Alliance, Colby College and many others. The NPA looks forward to the ongoing partnership and the support of the town of Mercer.

2021 Sheriff's Office Annual Report



Dale P. Lancaster Sheriff

It is my continued honor and privilege to serve as your Sheriff. The Office of the Sheriff oversees the operations of the County Jail, law enforcement, court security, and civil process. Somerset County is approximately 4,000 square miles. The County is comprised of 27 towns, 6 plantations, and 83 unorganized townships. This year, I was unanimously voted by the Maine Sheriff's Association Executive Board to serve as the next President of the MSA. I continue my appointments to the Board of Directors for the New England State Police Information Network and Maine's Drug Enforcement Agency.

As we continue into our second year of the Covid-19 pandemic, it has continued to impact our law enforcement, Courts, civil processing, and Jail.

Considerable time and resources has been spent purchasing PPE gear and developing and implementing Covid-19 safety measures to protect Deputies and Corrections Officers. We resumed service of civil paperwork and have seen a significant increase in receipts. We stopped in-person visits at the Jail, except that Attorneys are now allowed to meet with their clients in the no-contact areas of the Jail. We continue to evaluate and modify our safety measures as the pandemic continues to affect our daily operations.

Law Enforcement

The patrol division is comprised of 11 rural patrol Deputies. Through funding from the State of Maine, we have one Deputy dedicated to patrolling the unorganized townships. The patrol division is overseen by a Lieutenant. The Detective division is comprised of three Detectives and is overseen by a Lieutenant. The Sheriff's Office continues to partner with MDEA (Maine Drug Enforcement Agency) to have an agent assigned to the Detective division. The patrol division has 2 trained drug recognition experts and 1 forensic mapper.

The Sheriff's Office has 4 Deputies assigned to Madison along with a Secretary/Dispatcher. In 2021, the Sheriff's Office had 2 Deputies graduate from the Maine Criminal Justice Academy, Deputy Kyle Haseltine and Deputy Ashley Smith. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, a portion of Deputy Haseltine's training was done remotely. Throughout 2021, The Sheriff's Office Criminal Division investigated a large volume of illicit drug trafficking activities. The Sheriff's Office obtained and executed numerous drug search warrants, which subsequently led to the arrest and conviction of numerous people from Maine and out of State on various Federal and State level drug trafficking charges. Illegal drugs, in particular Fentanyl, continue to be an issue in Somerset County. The Criminal Division dedicates a large amount of time and resources to combat this problem. The Criminal Division investigated numerous serious felony level cases to include robberies, burglaries, thefts, scams, aggravated assaults, unattended deaths and sexual abuse cases. In 2021, the Crimes Against Persons Detective investigated 30 sex crimes. 18 of those cases involved child sexual abuse where forensic interviewing was utilized. Detective Jeremy Leal is a Children's Advocacy Center forensic interviewer. Because of these investigations, and working with the District Attorney's Office prosecuting these cases, we were able to get substantial sentences in a number of child abuse cases. The Sheriff's Office Criminal Division tracks individuals who are required by law to register as sex offenders. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, our inperson check-ins for registered sex offenders were limited. 3 individuals were charged with Sex Offender Registration Notification Act violations.

Jail

The Somerset County Jail, when operating at full capacity, operates with 36 budgeted Correctional Officers, 8 Shift Supervisors, 2 cooks, 12 program and support staff, and 9 administrative staff to include



Major Cory Swope, who is the Jail Administrator. The County Jail is now 14 years old. We are projecting the Jail bond will be paid off in 2028. The County Jail is nationally accredited through the American Correctional Association and is operating under nationally accepted best practice standards. The County Jail is also PREA (Prison Rape Elimination Act) certified. In 2021, the Somerset County Jail processed 831 bookings, a 30% decrease from 2020. Bookings decreased because I asked State and local law enforcement agencies to utilize alternative means of enforcement rather than arrest, unless it was a life safety issue, in an effort to keep Covid-19 out of the Jail. State and local law enforcement leaders in Somerset County were a great help in this effort. We continue to partner with Redington-Fairview General Hospital and their Pathways to Recovery opioid response implementation grant consortium.

- In 2021, a significant amount of time and resources have been dedicated to extensive
 modification of operations related to the Covid-19 pandemic. After almost 18 months
 of no Covid-19 outbreaks, we entered an outbreak beginning October 23, 2021 that was
 cleared by the CDC within 30 days. Due to the physical design of the facility and the
 diligent efforts of staff, positive inmates were isolated and the outbreak was contained
 from spreading throughout the Jail.
- The triennial PREA (Prison Rape Elimination Act) Audit was completed on December 30-31, 2021. PREA Certification reflects adherence to the highest Federal standards in ensuring a safe environment for staff and inmates of the facility.
- The triennial ACA (American Correctional Association) Audit is scheduled for May 9-11, 2022. ACA Accreditation solidifies that the Jail is operating under nationally accepted best practice standards.
- In 2021, we were able to find grant money to procure a Doctor of Nursing Practice to work with those inmates that are on the medical assisted treatment program.
- The Jail is undertaking the project of a new inmate telephone system and Jail management system.
- Recruitment and hiring initiatives continue to be ongoing. Starting Corrections Officer
 wages was recently adjusted to \$18.23 per hour in an effort to be more competitive
 throughout the local economy.

Civil Process


In 2021, the Somerset County Sheriff's Office Civil Deputies received 1,707 papers to process and serve. That is a 43% increase from 2020.

Calls for Service


- In 2021, the Sheriff's Office received 15,008 calls for service from our residents. This
 represents a 3.4% increase from 2020.
- During 2021, the Sheriff's Office responded to 225 calls for service from the Town of Mercer, which is a 9.6% decrease from 2020. These calls included 18 motor vehicle accidents, 15 motor vehicle stops, 3 calls for domestic disturbances, 6 calls requesting citizen assistance, as well as calls for theft, criminal threatening, welfare checks and other requests for police services.



Dear Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I co-authored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000th consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.

On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6th Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the American Rescue Plan, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21st century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in the American Rescue Plan, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It remains a privilege to represent you in Congress, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on for the people of the Second Congressional District.

This year, our small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, states, and towns continued to face challenges related to the coronavirus pandemic. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health and our economy that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. While we are not yet out of the woods, there is a light at the end of the tunnel. Still, I know there are many Mainers who will continue to need assistance getting through this pandemic. I am committed to making sure our communities' most urgent needs are met to get our economy back on track

One thing I am particularly proud of this year is that Democrats, Republicans, and the Biden Administration worked together to pass the bipartisan *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act*, which will make a once-in-ageneration investment in our nation's infrastructure and support Maine jobs. For one, shipbuilders at Bath Iron Works are a vital part of our economy, and the ships they build are critical to our national security. Throughout 2021, I led the Maine congressional delegation in pushing back against the Biden Administration's proposed decrease in DDG-51 shipbuilding, a proposal that would have had serious consequences for the shipbuilding workforce at BIW, one of the two shippards that produces these destroyers, and American naval capabilities around the world. We fought successfully to include authorization for construction of three new DDG-51 destroyers in the final National Defense Authorization Act. I will continue to work hard with my colleagues on the House Armed Services Committee to ensure that we protect our national security and shipbuilding jobs in Maine.

My most meaningful work in Congress continues to be providing direct assistance to Mainers. My staff and I stand ready to serve you. This authorization to continue from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 39: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts on behalf of the town. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 12: Voted to authorize the selectmen to fill vacancies on non-elected boards and committees by appointment. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 36: Voted to allow the Selectmen to authorize cutting in the Town Forest in accordance with the Town Forest Management Plan. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

2008 Annual Town Meeting

ARTICLE 35: The town voted to authorize the Municipal Officers to close East Sandy River Road for the winter from the transfer Station entrance to the snow plow turn around. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 44: The Town voted to authorize the Municipal Officers to temporarily borrow money as needed to cover the Town's expenses until this year's tax revenues are received. Any such loan to be repaid in full within the year. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 45: The Town voted to appropriate \$1,000.00 from surplus to pay the interest on the tax anticipation loan, if needed. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 48: The Town voted to apply for a Maine State Archives Grant to assist with the preservation of the town's historical records, and to accept and appropriate such funds if received. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 50: The Town voted to authorize the Municipal Officers to accept donations to be added to the principal of the scholarship funds. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 51: The Town voted to appropriate all State refunds of registrations fees for the

Mercer Bog Riders. This authorization to continue in effect from year to year until amended or revoked by Town Meeting.

2011 Annual Town Meeting

ARTICLE 35: The Town voted to authorize the selectmen to appoint one individual from the Town of Mercer to represent the town on the Skowhegan Cal Ripken Baseball Board of Directors. This to be a continuing article unless amended at a future town meeting.

2020 Annual Town Meeting

ARTICLE 48: The Town voted to authorize the tax collector or treasurer to accept prepayments of taxes not yet committed, pursuant to 36 MRSA § 506, the amount collected not to exceed the previous year's taxes. Interest on any prepayment will be zero percent.

ARTICLE 49: The Town voted to allow the Town Treasurer, after Municipal Officers approval, to file a waiver of automatic foreclosure at the Registry of Deeds, pursuant to 36 MRSA section 944, on real estate that may be burdensome on the town.

ARTICLE 50: The Town voted to prohibit a Municipal Officer from being an employee or an independent contractor for the Town of Mercer.

ARTICLE 51: The Town voted to ensure that work conducted on behalf of the Town of Mercer in excess of five hundred dollars (\$500) must have a written contract.



ARTICLE 44: The Town voted to authorize the Select Board, on behalf of the Town, to join with other participating municipal and quasi-municipal employers to group self-insure for the provision of workers' compensation benefits, as authorized by 39-A MRSA sec 03, said group to be known as the "Maine Municipal Association Workers' compensation Fund" (Fund); and for that purpose and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements among participating employers, to authorize the Select Board to enter into a Fund Indemnity Agreement on behalf of the Town and take whatever other actions may be necessary. The authority granted herein shall continue until revoked.

ARTICLE 46: The Town voted to implement a policy that any vendor, service provider, contractor or individual shall be accountable by an itemized invoice(s) or receipt of purchase prior to approval by the Municipal Officers and payment. The authority granted herein shall continue until amended or revoked.
